PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

I am writing this update from a refreshed perspective after spending some time on the beach for a special family reunion where I could reflect with laughter and tears as stories were shared of past accomplishments and failures, personal and professional, and looking forward to more laughter, less tears and feeling more empowered to tackle those tasks on my to-do list.

With that as a background, I will try to bring you up to speed on the many issues that have been getting the most attention of your Board since my last update. The biggest issue affecting the official reporters, and thereby affecting the freelance reporters in the end game, is Chief Justice Gildea's agenda to essentially degrade the integrity of the record by increasing the use of digital recording in the name of so-called "efficiency and cost savings."

MAVRC helped form a workgroup with official reporters around the state that, first, recommended the four steno reporters that Chief Justice Gildea and the Judicial Council allowed to be part of the Court Record Workgroup, which is otherwise made up of a District Court Judge from each of the ten Judicial Districts, a judge from the Minnesota District Judges Association, one Appellate Court Judge, Tammy Halonen from the Hennepin County CMR Unit, a District Court Administrator, with Retired Judge Ed Lynch appointed as the Committee Chairman. They requested the Teamsters, on behalf of the official reporters, choose one ER reporter, one steno, one realtime, one from the CMR

Unit in Hennepin County and one from out-state Minnesota. The MAVRC workgroup recommended Jill Garrison from the Second District, Rhonda Route from the First District, Dana Carmichael from the Fourth District, and Sara Borchardt from the Ninth District.

Our statewide workgroup has been monitoring the monthly Judicial Council meetings, as well as meeting monthly (after each monthly meeting of the Judicial Council Court Record Workgroup) to gather and share data from resources all over the U.S. that will help support the stenographic reporter and debunk whatever data the digital proponents bring to the Judicial Council. MAVRC has written letters to several bar associations to inform them of this initiative being led by the Chief Justice asking for their help as well. MAVRC is also seeking personal testimonials, anonymous or otherwise, from reporters

in Hennepin County, as well as from attorneys who have been denied an inperson steno reporter or received subpar transcripts from digitally reported proceedings to present to the JC Court Record Workgroup.

The JC Court Record Workgroup has now met three times, and presentations have been made thus far by Hennepin County's manager of the CMR model, Tammy Halonen; an ER reporter from the Fifth District; Jennifer Sati, the court reporting and captioning program director from Anoka Tech; one of the CMR unit reporters, who is a steno reporter; a group presentation given by Jill Garrison, Rhonda Route and Sara Borchardt, with a realtime demonstration given by Debbie Peterson and her First District Judge, Judge Wilton, and their law clerk, wherein the judges on the workgroup were all provided with a realtime feed via CaseViewNet. For some judges from out-state districts, this was the first time they had seen realtime since they did not have a steno reporter. which provided a great opportunity for our steno reporters on the JC Court Record Workgroup to showcase the benefits of a steno reporter. Then a software guru from Stenograph presented on our behalf, as well focusing on the technology and the security of the Cloud and explaining the AudioSync features. Thank you to all who have taken part in this effort, particularly for those who had the stressful task of presenting before the Judicial Council Workgroup on behalf of our profession.

There have been other issues affecting the official court reporters this year as well before the legislature. With the help and guidance of Joel Carlson, our lobbyist, we were successful in stopping some pivotal language changes in the statute relating to court reporters. We also testified before the House and Senate to provide some explanation of the official court reporter's transcript ramifications when the County Attorneys Association brought a bill forward to be relieved of the requirement to provide transcripts of dash cam footage when used as trial exhibits.

Governor Dayton signed a proclamation recognizing Court Reporting and Caption Week earlier this year, and MAVRC took part in an exhibition on February 15 at Anoka Tech where we presented live demonstrations showcasing the variety of occupations that make up our fantastic profession. We had a number of judges attend from different counties and also a representative of State Court Administration. There were several prospective students, who had the opportunity to speak with working official and freelance reporters as well as several CART and broadcast captioners. Rachel Erickson provided realtime of some of the presentations, and the many guests were excited to tour the onsite captioning suite that Anoka Tech uses in their program. Thank you to all our members who volunteered their time and energy to help with this event.

We have also added some new tabs on our website to help keep our membership informed as issues present themselves. We have included a "Hot Topics" tab where people can post questions or concerns they may have regarding things that are happening in the profession. We have also added a "Career Advancement" tab, where we will have information available about testing and certifications, how-to's on promoting our profession, etc. Our Technology Committee is working to enhance our Facebook presence as well. We also have posters promoting our profession available to any member who would like to post one or more in their own courthouses or high-visibility areas in their community or local schools.

Just contact me and I will make arrangements to get them to you.

We just held our spring seminar, where our sessions covered transitioning into CART and broadcast captioning, investing for retirement, an enlightening, but frightening, active shooter presentation, and a session on how to attract students to our profession with suggestions on how to speak at career fairs or approaching local high schools with brochures and posters showcasing our profession. Joel Carlson talked about what was happening at the legislature, and Jill Garrison and I followed up with a town hall type meeting where we addressed the issues with the Judicial Council in an open forum. Thank you to Brandi and Monica for all the work vou did in lining up speakers and the caterers, and thank you to everyone else who helped make this seminar a success!

Several of our members have been presenting at career fairs at high schools throughout the metro, and Rachel Erickson and Jane Schleusner attended the MN School Counselor's Conference for the second year in a row, where they were able to reach a huge group. **Thank you**, Rachel and Jane, for doing that!

Our fall seminar and 110th Anniversary of Court Reporting will be October 6-7 at the Embassy Suites Airport location. We have several great presenters lined up already and are working hard to fill the remaining open spots. We also are bringing back the Award of Excellence to coincide with our fall seminar; details on that to follow. On that Friday evening, there will be a fun celebration, so plan to stay and enjoy the entertainment and time to catch up with friends and colleagues! Watch for more information coming your way.

A POSSIBLE COLLABORATIVE EFFORT WITH WCRA

Following the recent MAVRC spring seminar, a group of reporters got together at Buona Sera in Champlin for dinner and to have a preliminary discussion exploring the possibility of MAVRC combining forces with the Wisconsin Court Reporters Association on future conventions.

Given the time and expense involved in planning and holding annual conventions, the MAVRC Board of Directors felt it would be prudent to look into the advantages and disadvantages of working together with WCRA on their 2018 fall convention being held in Eau Claire, Wisconsin. Some of the advantages discussed were being able to afford higher-caliber or national speakers, a lessening of the work load for each state association, a reduction in costs for the NCRA representative to attend, increased networking opportunities, the ability for the two boards to work together on current issues, and the possibility of working with Stenograph to provide more specialized training. The main disadvantages discussed were the added distance MAVRC members

THE PASSING OF A COURT REPORTING LEGEND - ERVIN G. GROSS

AVRC has recently learned of the death of Ervin Gross. Erv passed away on April 25, 2017, due to complications of Alzheimer's disease.

While many of us were not personally familiar with Erv, he played an integral role in the court reporting world from the late 1940s to the early 1990s. In addition to helping establish Ray J. Lerschen & Associates, he was very active in the Minnesota Reporters Association (MSRA) as well as the National Shorthand Reporters Association, now known as the National Court Reporters Association.

Erv first began service with MSRA as a board member in the late 1960s and eventually served as its president in 1975. Concurrent with and following his service with MSRA, Erv contributed his talents to NSRA for a considerable number of years, eventually becoming president from 1981-1982. During his time on the NSRA Board, Erv spent a great deal of his time fighting the threat of electronic recording, which helped solidify stenographic reporting as the preferred choice for making the record. Throughout his career, Erv was highly respected among his court reporting peers and many others in the legal field due to his exemplary standards of leadership and an undying personal commitment to achieving excellence as a court reporter. We thank you, Erv, for your service. May you rest in peace.

It was a sad day for me, and for many court reporters throughout the country, to learn of Erv's passing on April 25th. He was very well respected in the court reporting and legal communities, especially in Minnesota. Erv was actually one of the last pen writers in Minnesota. Erv loved life. Not only was he a great family man, but Erv enjoyed his Lerschen family, too. He made yearly trips up north fishing with fellow colleagues, as well as attending court reporting conventions throughout the state and nationally.

It was Erv who hired me on at Lerschen. He was not only a mentor to me but to all the reporters he worked with. He, along with the other partners, built an amazing court reporting firm.

We salute you, Erv, for a life well lived and for all your contributions to the profession you loved so much. You will truly be missed.

He had the mind and the personality behind the firm's growth as a successful reporting service, not only in Minnesota but throughout the United States.

After a couple of years, we upgraded to Lac des Mille Lacs in Canada. It was usually over the Memorial Day weekend except for one or two fall expeditions to a different Canadian lake. Ray wasn't interested in the long trip so it was Jack, Erv, Noel, and myself. Lac des Mille Lacs is a huge lake with many bays. After the first two years of fishing with a guide, we bought a tent and would camp out on an island a few miles away. The fishing was incredible, as was our time together away from reporting.

Erv and I became good friends, as did our wives. We played golf and attended state conventions together. When Erv became president of the Minnesota Court Reporters Association, the convention was set up for Madden's Resort on Gull Lake. He put me in charge unofficially of sports and recreation.

Erv Gross was a man of many talents. He was well respected by all who knew him. I was glad to call him my friend.

no time like the present to talk to your family, friends, clients, judges, and school counselors about the court reporting and captioning profession. The one thing that is pointedly obvious when attending a career fair is the amazement when someone sees the realtime feed on the screen and realizes that there is a person who is making that possible. Consider visiting your child's school or the school in your neighborhood and talk to the career counselor about our profession or volunteer to do a demonstration to a class or participate in a career fair. I had the opportunity recently to show off my realtime to a group of Girl Scouts who were visiting the courthouse in Anoka. This was the first time they had ever seen a court reporter and, of course, they were in awe of the steno machine itself and really got excited when they would see their name come out on the screen! The parents and troop leaders were also very interested and had many questions. Seize those

opportunities!

We also just held Law Day in the Tenth Judicial District. We had realtime going on during mock trials as well as realtime being shown during a question and answer session with several of our judges and the public. Again, there were many questions asked about court reporting and why tape recording and voice recognition had not taken over our profession. These are perfect opportunities to educate the public about the superior technology we bring to the courtrooms and conference rooms and stadiums and classrooms and peoples' living rooms! Take every opportunity that presents itself. Be your biggest cheerleader!

We are a talented bunch of professionals! Officials: write realtime for your judges. If you aren't comfortable doing that yet, at least write realtime for yourself until you are. The best way to improve your writing is to see where you need to make changes. Also, by doing that, it provides an opportunity to show others around you what the professional reporter does. Instead of keeping the "mystery of the little machine" alive, we need to show off to everyone the amazing skill set we possess and what services we provide.

We are also exploring some changes to increase the attendance at our seminars. We will be sending out a survey to the membership in an attempt to gather some data to help guide us in our future plans. Watch for that to come your way!



Newsworthy Note from NCRA

Attention: Candidates who passed the Certified Realtime Reporter (CRR) test prior to 2011

Prior to November, 2011, the CBC, CCP, and CRR Skills Tests were the same - five minutes of literary matter at 180 wpm. In November, 2011, the CRR changed to a two-voice testimony test at 200 wpm. Anyone who passed the CRR prior to November, 2011, does not need to take the CBC and/or CCP and/or CRC (Certified Realtime Captioner) Skills Test because they are the same test format. Anyone who passed the CRR on or after November, 2011, will need to take the CRC Skills Test, CRC workshop, and pass the written exam to become CRC certified.

This exception to use the CRR skills test history towards earning the CRC expires December 31, 2017. Any CRC candidate who has not fully earned the certification by December 31, 2017, will be required to pass the CRC skills exam regardless of prior testing history.







